Board confirms \$7 million shortfall

At its regular meeting on Monday, April 13, the Prairie Spirit Board of Education approved the release of budget information to update parents and the community about the school division's funding shortfall.

The school division's \$7 million funding shortfall is greater than the Board predicted and foreshadowed in the information letter sent to parents prior to the release of the provincial budget in March.

"We're very disappointed that the budget does not address the needs of students in Prairie Spirit School Division," said Larry

Pavloff, Board of Education Chair. "The funding shortfall is greater than we anticipated due to some unexpected funding changes from the Ministry." For example, increases in student enrolment will no longer be funded. Prairie Spirit is projecting a student enrolment increase of over 300 students for 2015/16.

"The shortfall is the amount of provincial funding compared to the cost of maintaining our current levels of programming and services for Prairie Spirit students," explained John Kuzbik, Director of Education.

Since the provincial budget was released, the Board has met on numerous occasions to analyze the budget's impact on the school division. In addition, the Board met with the Minister of Education to continue to advocate for adequate funding.

Prairie Spirit's 2015/16 funding increase of \$3.6 million covers the cost of the provincially-negotiated teacher salaries, leaving the school division with the same funding as last year. New costs, such as increased enrolment, contractual obligations and inflationary costs, are not covered with additional funding.

Prairie Spirit's funding shortfall and inequities began in 2012 when the new provincial education funding model came into effect. The complex formula does not recognize some of Prairie Spirit's operating costs, while providing funding to other school divisions that is not available to Prairie Spirit.

Board budget priorities:

- Improving student learning
- Improving adult learning
- Retaining staff
- Maintaining class sizes

Over the past two years, Prairie Spirit has made programming cuts of approximately \$2 million. The Board

Prairie Spirit is funded significantly lower per student when

of Education used \$3 million. The Board of Education used \$3 million of limited reserve funds to balance last year's budget, with the assurance that the funding model would be adjusted to address significant inequities.

The \$7 million funding shortfall will challenge Prairie Spirit to maintain graduation rates, literacy and math achievement re-

sults and the success of First Nations and Métis students, all of which are among the highest in the province.

Last fall, the Board of Education identified its priorities for preparing the budget. The priorities continue to be: maintaining a strong focus on improving student and adult learning, retaining staff and maintaining current class sizes.

School year calendar 2015/16

The Prairie Spirit Board of Education formally approved the <u>calendar</u> for the 2015/16 school year on Monday, April 13.

Teachers will begin the school year on Monday, August 24, while students will start on Tuesday, September 1, prior to Labour Day.

The provincial government passed new legislation late last fall that allows an earlier school start date in exceptional years when Labour Day falls after September 5.

"We believe the calendar will maintain our focus on student learning while also supporting students, staff members and families," said Larry Pavloff, Board Chair.

Each year, the Prairie Spirit school year calendar is created through a collaborative process including input from the

Board of Education, Division administration, teaching staff, out-of-scope support staff, unionized support staff and parents.

The Division's Calendar Committee produced two calendar options and asked all staff to vote for their preferred calendar option. The results of this vote were shared with the Board.

The Ministry of Education requires that all school divisions publish their school calendars by May 1 each year.
